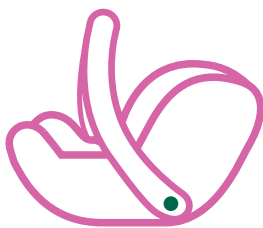
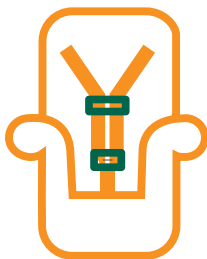




Counterfeit Car Seats



How to ensure your child's car seat is NOT counterfeit:

- + Look for a visible model number and manufacture date.
- + Verify that the manufacturer's contact information is listed and based in the United States.
- + Ensure the car seat is made of high-quality materials without flimsy parts.

Possible indicators that the seat could be counterfeit:

- + The price seems unusually low.
- + Stickers on the seat are in a foreign language or contain spelling/grammar errors.
- + The seat lacks labels with U.S. height and weight requirements.
- + There is no statement indicating compliance with federal motor vehicle safety standards.
- + The seat does not include a registration/recall card with prepaid postage from the manufacturer.

What to do if you have a counterfeit car seat:

1. File an unsafe product report with the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) at [nhtsa.gov/report-a-safety-problem](https://www.nhtsa.gov/report-a-safety-problem).
2. Notify the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) at [saferproducts.gov](https://www.saferproducts.gov).
3. Submit a report to the U.S. Department of Commerce at [stopfakes.gov](https://www.stopfakes.gov).
